### **What is Pupil Premium Funding?**

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between young people eligible for free school meals (FSM), looked after children (LAC), and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011 and is allocated to schools to work with pupils who:

- have been registered for free school meals at any point in the last six years (known as 'Ever 6 FSM').
- have been in local-authority care for 1 day or more
- have left local-authority care because of one of the following
  - adoption
  - special guardianship order
  - a child arrangement order
  - a residence order
- have a parent in the Services at any point in the last 5 years (known as 'Ever 5 Service Child) or in receipt of pensions under the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme (AFCS) and the War pensions Scheme (WPS)

Spalding Academy can decide how to spend the Pupil Premium for the benefit of the students, however, we will be held to account on how we have used this funding and the impact that it has had. Guidance has been given by the Government on strategies which could be used to improve pupils' progress and attainment. We have taken this advice on board in developing our own strategy.

The School Leadership Team and Governing Body monitor the impact of all spending and interventions, including the Pupil Premium. We endeavour to encourage parents and carers to apply for Free School Meals where pride, stigma or changing circumstances act as barriers to its take up.

### **Our Principles:**

- We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all of the pupils
- We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, including that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed (we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school

meals will be socially disadvantaged and that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals)

- Pupil Premium funding is used to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged
- Pupil Premium funding will be allocated following a needs analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals. Limited funding and resources means that not all children receiving free school meals will be in receipt of pupil premium interventions at one time

The Pupil Premium is spent in 3 main areas:

- Providing **academic** support to raise attainment
- Providing **enrichment** to encourage aspirational learning and engagement in school life
- Providing **emotional** support to foster the resilience and self-confidence to be a life-long learner

### Nature of Support for the financial year 2015 – 2016

The Pupil Premium funding received at Sir John Gleed School will be allocated in a number of ways.

<b>Amount</b>	<b>Purpose</b>
£122,130	To provide targeted small group and individual learning opportunities with HLTA teams in literacy and numeracy. To provide 1 to 1 learning support and emotional support.
£109,500	Contribution towards dedicated student managers for each year group offering social and emotional support for students. Contribution towards to Hayden Centre to support those with a high level of need. Family liaison worker employed as counsellor, working in partnership with vulnerable families.
£25780	For Year teams and departments to request funding focusing on raising attainment and narrowing the gap, eg provision of revisions guides, equipment, cooking ingredients.
£10000	To facilitate subsidised educational visits. Contribution towards the cost of uniform and equipment.
