The HM Treasury run a Graduate Programme which can be applied for if you have achieved or are on track for a minimum of a 2.2 in an undergraduate degree in any degree subject

Whilst there is no stipulation to a preferred subject, the competition will be high for posts therefore a relevant subject may strengthen your application if you are applying straight from university.

Something in Economics, Law or Business could be useful.

An understanding and passion for the role is key ;you will be expected to demonstrate this at interview

Entry requirements

To access au undergraduate degree you will usually need 2 to 3 A levels, or equivalent

You'll have two placements within the Department. You'll spend 18 months in your first posting, establishing a detailed grounding in a particular area of policy. At the end of this first posting, we'll move you into a second 18-month posting. Depending upon the needs of the department and your development needs, you could further your knowledge in your first policy area, or work in a different area to broaden your experience



Career path and progression

After completing the Graduate Development Programme, most of our Policy Advisers choose to develop a long-term career in the Treasury. Others gain experience in the wider Civil Service to share the knowledge and skills they've gained for the benefit of the UK population, and some move to other public sector organisations

Day to Day tasks

As a Policy Adviser, you'll become a specialist in a particular policy area. Your work will have a direct impact on the lives of millions of people

Your duties could include:

- provide Government with advice to help them to make decisions in the best interests of the public
- analysing data
- coordinating both short and long-term projects
- in Parliament supporting Ministers in a debate
- write briefings for Ministers and senior managers
- respond to written questions from MPs or members of the public

Financial managers and directors

Financial managers and directors plan, organise, direct and co-ordinate financial information and advise on company financial policy.

Common tasks in this job:

- participates in the formulation of strategic and long-term business plans, assesses the implications for the organisation financial mechanisms and oversees their implementation;
- plans external and internal audit programmes, arranges for the collection and analysis of accounting, budgetary and related information, and manages the company's financial systems;
- determines staffing levels appropriate for accounting activities;
- assesses and advises on factors affecting business performance.

Job holders in this unit group undertake a variety of administrative and clerical duties in national government departments, and in local offices of national government departments.

Common tasks in this job:

- assists senior government officers with policy work, external liaison or general administrative work:
- undertakes administrative duties specific to the operation of HM Revenue and Customs offices, Job Centres, Benefits Agency offices and other local offices of national government;
- maintains and updates correspondence, documents, data and other records for storage in files or on computer;
- classifies, sorts and files publications, correspondence etc. in offices and libraries;

- draws up a detailed plan for how to achieve each stage of the project;
