Year 10 News

We are very proud of the settled start which Year 10 have made this year, especially after being away from school for an extended period of time and the changes to day to day school life. Year 10 have very quickly adapted to this new way of working and their maturity towards the new safety rules at school has been excellent. Our priority is keeping students safe and happy within the school and the Year 10 zone is certainly a safe and happy place to be.

The new astro pitch has been recently opened to students at lunchtime, Year 10 in particular have made good use of this and the PE department have commented on year 10's high standards of behaviour in their use of this fantastic resource. Year 10 have also taken part in poetry activities in tutor time to celebrate national poetry day. We have enjoyed reading the poems which students have created and seeing their high engagement in these sessions.

The top tutor groups so far for attendance with 97% are forms 9 and 10 (Mr Clack and Mrs Fuller). We know how important it is to be in school as much as possible and the positive impact this has on student outcomes in their GCSE/BTEC's. Pupils with **no absence** are 2.2 times more likely to achieve 5+ GCSEs A*- C or equivalent including English and mathematics than pupils that missed 15-20% of KS4 lessons. At Spalding Academy we wish for all students to aim high and achieve their potential, so that they are prepared for the future and have the choice of careers which they deserve; good attendance is the foundation of this.

At the time of writing, Year 10 have achieved a whopping 64,485 achievement points! Well done year 10! This demonstrates the fantastic effort which the majority of our students are putting into their classwork and home learning tasks. Our top 3 students so far this academic year for achievement points are: 1st Patrycja Garbacz (825 points), 2nd Michal Chamera (805 points), 3rd Giulia Moldovan (705 points). We also have 78 students who have received no negative points at all, which is superb.

We would also like to take this opportunity to welcome the new students and their parents to the Year 10 team. Our new students have all made a good start and we look forward to seeing them grow and develop throughout the year.


The Careers department endeavour to keep students informed about Labour Market Information in our local area and nationally. Giving them this information will help them to make informed decisions about their future career and education choices.






Art & Design News

The students have thrown themselves back into working really well and the standard has grown with that.





Key Stage 4

What an amazing commencement to Term One, with the new 'normal' for both our year 10s and 11s. Their mature attitude and a keenness to do well recognises that despite the adversities of life they are able to remain focused and positive in their education.

<u>Year 10s:</u> have been studying poems from the anthology, together with lessons on writing creatively. We are delivering the poetry in clusters under three specific themes: power of nature; power of man and the power of war. This term we looked at nature. The students were not overly impressed to be studying poetry in the beginning, however, over time this attitude began to alter and some even dared to say that they really enjoyed the topic.

Creative writing some have found a challenge, especially writing descriptively; however, with the tools they have been given to improve their work, many have now produced some amazing pieces which will certainly bode well for the future.

Next term we continue with poetry, looking at the power of man.

<u>Year 11s:</u> have been focusing on English Literature, Paper 2, and this term, (*An Inspector* Calls) where they have been learning to understand the contextual features of the time and forming opinions about the characters in the play. They have thoroughly enjoyed the twists in plot and were agonising over the theme of responsibility and how Edwardian society was so different to present day life.

Next term we will be studying, *Macbeth*, another play, although a total contrast to Priestley's, *An Inspector Calls* and being written by Shakespeare I'm sure this will bring new challenges to be overcome.

Drop Everything and Read!

The first DEAR event of 2020 is happening soon! Year 7 students will start period 1 with a special session of reading with their teacher, designed to wider the students horizons and allow them some time to explore new ideas about the curriculum. We hope they will enjoy it!





Celebration of Reading: National Poetry Day 2020



We celebrated **National Poetry Day on the 1st October 2020** with some fantastic poems on the theme of 'Vision'. There were a range of activities in tutor time, in many lessons across a variety of subject areas and a competition open to all.

In tutor time students shared a video reading of Karl Nova's poem, written for the day, called 'See Through My Eyes'. Karl is a hip hop artist, poet and author and he encourages students to create their own poems explaining that 'vision is all about how you see the world'. There were also poems called 'The Ground' by poet Caroline Bird as well as 'Love in the Time of Corona Virus' by Nikita Gill for inspiration. We hope these poems will encourage our students to write amazing poems for the competition!







All students were invited to enter a school Poetry Competition on the theme of Vision and we are excited to judge the entries. You can read some of the poems and find out about the winners in the next newsletter




Performing Arts News

We have been delighted to welcome the new cohort of students to the Performing Arts BTEC Qualification course. They have already been working incredibly hard already and have impressed us with the development and understanding in such a short amount of time.

Throughout Component One students look at three different repertoires, the first of which is 'Everybody's Talking About Jamie'. Everybody's Talking About Jamie is a musical written by Tom MacRae. The story follows a 16-year-old teenager as he overcomes prejudice, beats the bullies and steps out of the darkness to become a drag queen. The musical covers many issues young people face in modern society and has been thoroughly enjoyed by all the students due to the honest, comical and at times heart wrenching script.









Year 11

This year group have also been working exceptionally hard to focus and progress in Performing Arts in preparation for their upcoming exam.

We have been studying several different repertoires to give the students as much knowledge of performance work as we can. They will then use this knowledge of skills and techniques when preparing their own piece of theatre.

Myth - Authorised absences (e.g.medical appointments) do not affect a student's attendance figure.

Truth – Any absence will affect a child's attendance figure, other than school trips (including sports

activities where the student represents the school), job or college interviews and university visits. Myth - Following the Isle of Wight decision, schools are now able to authorise leaves of absence during term time.

Truth – Lincolnshire continues to actively discourage any leave of absence during term time. Prosecution may still take place for persistent absence (attendance below 90%).
