# Executive Headteacher's Message

Dear parents/carers and students,

This has been a year like no other ... including a summer term like no other.



This 'bumper' newsletter shows many of our successes over the past year and I am certain that you will all enjoy reading all the articles and stories that make up this edition. To say that I am proud of all our students and staff would be an understatement!

I would firstly like to take this opportunity to personally thank you all .... to our students; staff; parents/carers and Governors for all your support over the last academic year, which has been incredible and it has been extremely appreciated. When I reflect on all that has happened this year it is hard to know how to summarise everything that the staff and students have been through, there have been many high points and a few low points. However, one thing is clear, the resilience of our young people is beyond belief and I would like to take the time to thank them all for supporting our high standards and expectations around the school. For all of our students, their behaviour is outstanding and it makes me so proud to see them working so hard and being so focussed and mature.

As well as the COVID challenge this academic year, we have had the challenge of the Teacher Assessed Grades (TAGS). I am pleased to say that we have successfully submitted all of our TAGS for Year 11 and we have also now received notification that our systems have been reviewed and do not need be further scrutinised. The exam boards did not come back to us to request a sample of work, which obviously shows we have been fair. It is clear that everyone is now satisfied that our processes and systems are effective and robust, and we look forward to handing out results to Year 11 on Thursday 12 August from 08.30am.

Regarding isolation, we have unfortunately, had to ask many students to self-isolate over the last year and particularly this term and we have all been keeping everything crossed that we get to the summer holiday with no more cases. As you will now know, in September we have been asked to mass test, using the lateral flow devise (LFD) tests, on students return to school. Due to the need to undertake the LFD tests, (which we have planned for Test 1 to take place on the two staff training days of Thursday 02 and Friday 03 September), we will now be bringing students back in to school in the week of 06 September. With our new Year 7 and Year 11 students returning to school on Monday 6 September and all other years on Tuesday 7 September.

For other year groups, Years 10 underwent their PPE (mocks) examinations this term. These went very well on the whole, and were an invaluable experience for our Year 10 students who have not experienced exam conditions previously, as they did not sit exams last year. This was about practising exam technique and helping us to identify students who are struggling, so we can start to bridge any gaps in learning. All students were exceptionally well organised and mature, despite this first sitting in exam conditions and for all this was a positive experience and good preparation for next year.

# Executive Headteacher's Message

Students in Key Stage 3 (Year 7-9) had the GL assessments to complete in core subjects and although technology made these assessments challenging to complete, the information will be useful to help us to support students with any necessary catch-up work, to again bridge any gaps in learning. I would like to thank parents for your support when these assessments have needed to be completed from home. This term has been incredibly disruptive for some of our Key Stage 3 learners, but we hope that they have enjoyed all being back in the classroom after their lockdown experience.

Regarding wider school experiences, we have still been able to go ahead with some of our extra-curricular work this year, particularly in Term 6, and it was particularly exciting to see the Sports Day events take place over the last few weeks. We cannot wait to have our full programme of extra-curricular activities back! However, sadly, we have really had to pull back on our end of term activities this year in order to try to prevent further issues with Track and Trace.

As we start to look towards the next year academic year, there is already a lot planned so that we can bring students and staff back safely and successfully into our school environment in September. A year to look forward to and one without Bubbles; one where we can return to specialist teaching areas; a return to school productions and events ... and much more!

Our focus for the next academic year is to maintain our school ethos of:

However, additionally to help us recover from the COVID pandemic, we will be focussing on 'closing the gaps' in students learning, supporting student wellbeing and will also place high focus on three key areas, which we see as being important to support our return in September:

A summary of the main tasks I carried out during my virtual Work Experience:

Throughout the afternoon we went through a PowerPoint presentation about the types of disorders and other areas that speech and language therapists work with, while also being able to learn about first hand experiences that the speech and language therapists on the zoom call had been through. We also went into breakout rooms and discussed questions and cases with other attendees on the zoom. We then looked into therapy techniques and how to observe cases as well as learning about the types of environments the therapists work in.

Lastly, we covered how to apply and skills needed to successfully qualify as a Speech and Language Therapist.

## What did you enjoy most about your virtual Work Experience?

Being able to hear first hand what they do and getting a better insight into the conditions they treat, as well as thinking about what I would do in the circumstance.

## Is there anything you did not enjoy about your virtual work experience?

I found the breakout rooms a little intimidating at first as there were some very confident people but I tried to be more confident and shared my ideas more the further we progressed through the afternoon.

# Have you been able to identify any skills that you are good at as part of your virtual Work Experience?

From analysing case studies and videos I think I have good observation skills and can independently think about methods I would use, as well as ascertaining what the individual is struggling with. Also, I think I could be quite flexible and my confidence is growing - through experience I could become good when working in multi-disciplinary teams and with other professionals.

# Have you been able to identify any skills that you need to improve as part of your virtual work experience? Please give details below.

I still think my confidence needs improving a bit more when it comes to sharing ideas, along with needing to make sure I am working on time management as when Dulcie was going through a day in her life it showed you have to be organised with time and be able to fit in a lot without becoming overwhelmed.

Yes, as it gave me a further insight into the role and I was able to apply different skills in multiple tasks. I would highly recommend this to other students.

What did you enjoy most about your virtual work experience? I enjoyed doing the quizzes as they were a good recap on the learning we had to do and watching the short 1-3-minute videos explaining the information.

One of our Year 12 students, Madelaine Sharp has always aspired to become a Vet. She has been very proactive in her research about the profession and took part in a 'Vet Mentor - Get into Veterinary Medicine' Conference earlier in the year.



The conferences which are arranged by Medic Mentor are such a valuable resource and they really give students and their parents a real insight into what is involved in the journey of becoming a Vet.

Madelaine has very kindly written a report about her experience.

"Before the conference I had a little idea of universities I would like to attend, but I knew very few. However, the vet mentor team suggested more universities and really explained the pros and cons to each ranging from agricultural to more populated universities and what each course programme consisted of.

They also explained about their awards program (which I have now applied to) which gives me experience in many of the fields for an upcoming experience, things like gaining the husbandry skill and wider reading opportunities.

What I also liked about the conference was the team encouraged people to ask questions to both them and the guest speakers to really get into the mind set of a day in the life of a vet. I remember a comment from one of the guest speaker which has really stuck



because it summed up the inconsistencies people have about being a vet, he said "being a vet is not like watching the programmes you see on TV, it's actually a long process of finding out what's wrong with the patient?, what can I do to help them? Rather like a detective".

I felt like the guest speakers definitely passed on their words of wisdom and truly inspired me further to enter into the world of veterinary science. Therefore I have to say I really enjoyed the teams presentations because they offered an insightful conference which my parents enjoyed learning about and myself which learnt a lot about the career I'm hoping to go into.

Furthermore, if they offered another conference like this I wouldn't hesitate to attend I would recommend it to anyone who is looking to go into the veterinary world because the information coming from these professionals helps with our future choices."

### Careers Club

The summer term also saw the launch of our drop in Careers Club for Year 10 students.

The aim of Careers Club is to enable students to ask questions and begin researching potential Post 16 progression routes e.g. Sixth form college courses or apprenticeships.

As the students move into Year 11, they will have the opportunity to have a 1:1 careers meeting with a member of the careers team or our external guidance providers, however, as these meetings are only short, it is impossible to investigate all possibilities which is why we have decided to offer these sessions either after school or at lunchtime.



When we return in September and students have settled back in to the daily routine of school, we will start Careers Club again.

It is very common for students to not have a set idea about what they would like to do in the future, so we hope that these sessions will go some way in helping them to make informed decisions about their next steps. This will be done through a series of discussions, careers based quizzes and questionnaires.

## My Great First Job!

As part of our careers programme, the careers team help and prepare students to apply for jobs and one aspect is conducting mock interviews. In addition to this various opportunities have been shared with students to enable them to enhance these interview skills further.

Year 11 student Leona Fenwick and Year 12 student Esther
Humphreys both took part in an online webinar which was arranged
by 'My Great First Job', about how to improve their interview skills.



Topics covered in the webinar were:

- All the stuff you need to do beforehand prepare like an absolute LEGEND!
- What questions to ask and how to make sure you ask them.
- How to SELL your skills from your Saturday job and when to do it.
- Why your hobbies/interests/downtime stuff are SUPER-IMPORTANT
- What to take to the interview and how to use it.
- How to finish the interview...and what to do when you get home.

Leona wrote the following review about her experience...

'I joined this webinar on Monday 10th May; there were approximately 90 people on it at the same time. It was on zoom and was very well structured. The man, Dale Willis, was really friendly and helpful throughout the webinar. It was interactive as there were polls to vote on at the beginning and end. It was responsive as he answered all the questions people asked. Dale covered all the subjects necessary to attend a job interview such as: how to prepare, what questions to ask to get the necessary details about the job, how to sell your skills and the 'dos and don'ts'. Also, in the webinar Dale included a previous attendee who now works with Mercedes as a Chemical Engineer and spoke to him about what he did in the interview and how Dale helped him. This was a really useful and worthwhile webinar; I will definitely use what I've learned in the future.'

Esther wrote the following review about her experience...

'I found this session really helpful, it helped clarify the important information to know for interviews and what to take with you. While also providing you with ways to prepare to then present yourself in the best way possible to get the job you want. In the session, the power point and information were easy to follow details, clear diagrams and answered all questions. I definitely recommend it.'



## BBC Radio 1 Big Weekend Connects!

During May, students had the opportunity to tune in live to a series of webinars which were produced by BBC Radio 1 giving an insight into the media and creative industries.

Students were able to get tips from experts in film, music, gaming, radio and more about how they got their big break?



Jessica Glover, Year 10, took part in the TV & Film Industry session which was presented by Jordan North, BBC Radio 1 presenter and famous from 'I'm a Celebrity'. This is what she had to say about her experience...

'I attended this session feeling curious about this industry and wanting to learn more and after listening to the different speakers on the show I have a greater knowledge of where the industry can take me.

I learnt about the different pathways and opportunities I could be led to alongside learning a number of new skills. I also learnt about different roles in the industry and about job roles I never knew about, like a casting producer. I learnt that for all the different roles throughout TV and film you don't require a large amount of experience in the industry to be able to achieve higher up roles from acting to directing.

It was also said that to be able to get where you want to be you need to put yourself out there and show people who you are. You also need to make sure to express yourself and don't be disappointed if something doesn't go to plan whether that be writing, blocking a TV show or editing for a film as you can always go back and try again with different ideas. It is also important to have a good mindset and motivational skills to progress in work however, it is important to take time for yourself and not push yourself too hard so you can produce your best work.

Throughout this session we were given so many helpful tips and pointers to help us to get started with this industry and that will help us in the future. It was also helpful that towards the end of the session we were able to ask any questions that we may have for the guest panellists and were able to hear their advice and how they solved problems in different situations. I really enjoyed this session and being able to learn more about this industry and where I could be led to along the way.'

# Teach The Nation To Code - Free online coding workshop


In February several students took part in a free coding workshop sponsored by Aviva, certified by the National Cyber Security Centre.

During the day students were taught how to code and how to gain confidence in the basics of Python programming.

They learnt the following during the day:

- Coding fundamentals in Python
- How to create working code using operators, conditional statements and loops
- How to understand syntax in Python
- How to understand and how to process problems and solve them with Python code
- How to work with all the Python data structures: lists, dictionaries, sets, tuples
- How to create safe and secure code

Patrycja Garbacz took part in the day and this is what she had to say...

"The workshop taught us basic functions in Python and how they can connect with each other in a working example, for example a tax calculator. We had a lot of opportunities to ask questions, and this was helpful when I was confused about things. In the workshop we learned how to program things like if statements (if a certain condition is met, a certain thing will happen) and how to complete some mathematical functions. Overall, it was worth the time and was a very educational experience that I enjoyed."







Students worked incredibly hard to complete their Component Two assessments and we are very proud of all their results.



## Message from Head of PE

With the reopening of school and the return of students, it has been refreshing to get back 'out on the field' in the fresh air teaching proper PE lessons again! With the lockdown restrictions over, we now feel the need to keep the students as active as possible, not just for the obvious physical benefits but also the mental and social benefits too.



### Changing and activity time

COVID-19 Year 'bubble' precautions have meant PE staff have to meet and register PE classes at a classroom before walking them safely to the changing rooms. From a PE teacher point of view, every minute saved changing is a minute more of being physically active in the lesson so we've asked students to get changed as quickly as possible.

### Safety equipment

I fully appreciate this safety equipment is an added expense on top of school uniform and the rest of the PE kit, however they are necessary for health and safety. As a school we provide school uniform and PE kit from the uniform shop (which also now stocks gum shields and shin pads) all at cost price to try and keep costs down for parents.

With the end of the academic year upon us, I wanted to write to you regarding school PE kit and the new academic year. As a school and a PE Department we are fully appreciative that the last 18 months have been difficult with COVID-19 restrictions and lockdowns affecting us all, especially the students. Throughout this academic year we have had an increasing number of issues with students having incorrect or missing PE kit, a lot of the time this is due to students growing out of clothing during lockdowns and not really realising until they are back in school or not owning/misplacing their white/blue socks. We have tried to be mindful of the situation and supportive by lending PE kit where we can plus we have allowed pupils time to organise new items. From September PE will return for all year groups and the Spalding Academy PE kit is available and <u>must</u> be bought from the Spalding Academy uniform shop.

# R.E. News



The Year 7 students have been studying the religion of Islam. They have looked at their beliefs, teachings and some of their practices including Ramadan and festivals. As this is one of the religions studied at GCSE it gives the students a good basic understanding giving students an insight into the differences and similarities between two of the world's biggest religions Christianity and Islam.

Year 8 are now completing their final unit of the year called 'Planet X' where they imagine they have had to start life on a new planet due to the destruction of Earth. They have looked at how their planet should be organised. To do this they have looked at what it means to be a refugee, what is important to them in their lives, religious and non-religious rules, religious and non-religious leaders, the convention of Human Rights and how the media plays a role in what they learn about and believe. Using all this information they have created rules and leaders for their new Planet.

## DON'T BE FOOLED

We need your help to warn young people about the dangers and consequences of becoming a money mule.

### What is a money mule?

A money mule is someone who transfers stolen money through their own bank account on behalf of someone else and is paid for doing so.

Criminals need money mules to launder the profits of their crimes.

Young people are increasingly being targeted to become money mules. They are approached online or in person, including through social media, at school, college or sports clubs. Sometimes people they know persuade them to take part, often because they are also acting as money mules.

Mules will usually be unaware of where the money comes from - commonly fraud and scams - and that it can go on to fund crimes such as drug dealing and people trafficking.

## Being a money mule is illegal.

When someone is caught, their bank account will be closed, and they will have problems getting student loans, mobile phone contracts and credit in the future. They could even face arrest for money laundering which carries a maximum sentence of 14 years in prison.

### What to look out for

Tell-tale signs that someone might be involved could be them suddenly having extra cash, buying expensive new clothes or top-of-the-range mobile phones and gadgets with very little explanation as to how they got the money. They may also become more secretive, withdrawn or appear stressed.

## Term 6 2020/2021 Secondary Parents Update

Now that summer has arrived, young people may wish to head outdoors more often. Please remind them of the dangers when congregating in groups on or around the street, in car parks or anywhere near moving vehicles. Be aware that quieter residential areas will also have residents, visitors and delivery vehicles moving frequently in and out of the area, and it can be easy for drivers to miss someone in their blind spots when manoeuvring their vehicles. Remind those young people you look after to play safely and keep their eyes and ears open near vehicles.

### E-Scooters

E-scooters are growing in popularity, however it is illegal for privately owned e-scooters to be ridden in a public place, or a place where the public has access - supermarket car parks for example.

E-Scooters on hire, as part of a new government scheme, are allowed in public places, however there are strict rules (available from the hirer) that outline where they can be used. Despite the laws put in place to govern the use of E-scooters, they remain available to purchase, and many users have been seen riding them with little care and consideration for their own safety or other road users.

### Drivers

Please take care when travelling around residential areas and villages. As we approach the summer holidays, there are likely to be more children out on the roads. If you drive an electric or hybrid vehicle, don't forget that many pedestrians may not hear your approach. Reducing your speed and allowing yourself more time to obverse hazards and react, will put you and those on the road in a safer position.



**Bikes** 

Always ensure that your young person wears a correctly fitted cycling helmet to stay safe when riding a bike. Cycle helmets are available from many well-known chain stores, as well as local sports specialists.

Remind them that it is dangerous and illegal to carry any additional passengers on their bike as the balance will be affected which can lead to serious incidents and injuries.

During the holiday periods it is easy to become complacent about the safety risks, and potential consequences; have fun but remain vigilant.

### Transition to new schools or colleges

If your child is moving to a new school or college from September, it may be useful for them to plan how they are to travel to their new site safely and without rushing. When we rush it is easy to forget about our safety.
